## PART 1

### Description of current provision/policy and main beneficiaries/stakeholders

The Local Authority has a statutory duty to deliver Children's Centre services. This dates from the 2006 Childcare Act and subsequent guidance of 2013. The legislation requires the Local Authority to:

- o Improve the well-being of young children in their area and reduce inequalities between them
- o Make sure that early childhood services are provided in an integrated manner
- o Ensure that partners work together to commission early childhood services
- o Make arrangements for sufficient Children's Centres, so far as reasonably practical to meet local need
- o Ensure there is consultation before any significant changes are made to Children's Centre provision in the area, and
- o Consider whether early childhood services should be provided through Children's Centres in the area; and that this legislation is currently under review.

The definition of a Children's Centre in the Childcare Act 2006, as amended by the Apprenticeships, Skills, Children and Learning Act 2009, is a place, or a group of places:

- a) Which is managed by or on behalf of, or under arrangements made with, an English local authority, with a view to securing that early childhood services in their area are made available in an integrated manner
- b) Through which each of the early childhood services is made available, and
- c) At which activities for young children are provided, whether by way of early years provision or otherwise.

In Northamptonshire, Children's Centre Services deliver activity at levels 2 and 3 and support Level 4 activity. This commenced in August / September 2014 followed a tendering exercise earlier that year. An award relating to this tender was not made in Corby and pre-existing arrangements were extended and maintained.

In August / September 2014 Northamptonshire Libraries and Information Service assumed lead responsibility for Level 1 (Universal) activity previously delivered by agencies responsible for Children's Centre Services.

The provision of universal children centre services supports provision the Council already commissions for parents and young children, these include:

- o The provision of 0-19 service delivered by health visitors and school nurses
- o Provision of the free entitlement to Early Years settings for delivery of childcare and education for 2,3 and 4 year olds
- o Provision of targeted children centre services in areas of higher need.

Feedback relating to children’s centre provision from the Review of Library Services Consultation October 2017 – January 2018	<p>As part of the consultation on the Review of Library Services October 2017 – January 2018, respondents were asked “Using a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 being ‘No impact’ and 10 being ‘Significant impact’, if you have children under 5 years and access the universal Children’s Centre offer please tell us how much of an impact this proposal would have on you if implemented?” and “What do you think could be done to help mitigate the impact of this proposal?”</p> <p>Some respondents took the opportunity to provide their thoughts on the library closures rather than specifically how they would be impacted with regard to children’s centre services. However, respondents who used the services stated that they valued them, and in particular the opportunities they offer for children to socialise and also to reduce isolation amongst parents, especially new mothers.</p> <p>Some people expressed the view that there was little alternative provision (in particular free provision) in their area and that if they lost their universal children’s services, it would have a negative impact. The information provided as part of the universal children’s centre service offer was valued by service users and there was an appreciation in general of the importance of early years services in improving life chances and outcomes.</p>

<p>We acknowledge that any change to universal children’s centre service provision has the potential to affect women (parents), children and young people and women who are pregnant or have recently had a baby. In addition, in South Northamptonshire area, the profile of the locality, known service users and potential service users, show that change could also potentially impact upon people with disabilities/people from a BME background/people on lower incomes/people in rural areas; however, recommissioning based on need should mean those that need the services most should have access to an evidence based service to help them improve their families health and wellbeing and children’s development.</p> <p>The current consultation will help inform the future provision of universal children’s centre services by helping us identify need and how people wish to access services in future.</p>	<p>A twelve week consultation will run from 23<sup>rd</sup> March to 15<sup>th</sup> June, where service users and professionals will be consulted on how they currently use universal children’s centre services where they are currently provided on library premises, and what they would like to see in the future, as well as seeking views on alternative venues.</p>
